Consider your group



- Consider your class: their strengths, interests, and what will motivate them.
- Involve everyone— students can write, illustrate, photograph, design covers or help with construction.
- Decide the structure: individual books, small-group projects or one class book.

Set realistic goals



• Ensure the project is broken into small, achievable steps for students.

Audience



• The primary audience for the finished books will be the school community and the wider local community. If multiple books are produced, consider hosting a school exhibition.

Cross-Curricular work



- Incorporate a range of subjects English, Visual Arts, Digital Technologies, Home Economics, Engineering, Geography, History, Gaeilge etc.
- Link the project to relevant JCSP statements, including Cross-Curricular statements, as this
 project supports many cross-curricular outcomes.

Inventive Topics for "Make a Book" Creations



- A Short Play: Write a brief script with stage directions, set instructions and act it out; add photographs for illustration.
- Creative Story Writing: Produce an imaginative story thrillers work especially well.
- 'How To' Book: Explain how to care for an animal, play a game or teach a personal skill.
- Informative Text: Create clear guidelines on topics like skincare, makeup or healthy living.
- A Survey: Students collect data and present their findings in a visually creative format.
- Agony Aunt / Uncle Column: Write an advice column responding to fictional letters.
- A Book of Irish Saints: Research and present short profiles of Irish saints.
- Irish A- Z Fabric Book: Produce an illustrated alphabet booklet, possibly with embroidery.
- **Project Journal**: Document a class project or field trip with photographs and notes (e.g. local area study or a chocolate factory visit).
- Student Magazine: Create a two-page magazine spread on a topic of your choice, working individually, in pairs or in a group.
- A 3D Book: Design a tactile, three dimensional book using fabrics, prints, slides or pictures.
- Local History: A non-fictional book exploring the history of the area surrounding the school.
- An Information Book: Write a peer-focused educational booklet (e.g. for CSPE).
- Wood Technology / Engineering: Make display stands, printed fabric covers or digital designs.
- Digital Media: Use digital tools such as PowerPoint, Prezi, Keynote, Comic Life, Animoto or Glogster to create digital stories or posters.
- Magic Books: Design a "Book of Spells" or a magical guide inspired by the Harry Potter universe.





Designing the Book: Creative Ideas for Students

Presentation

- Plan how the book will look and how it will be displayed
- Consider additional items that enhance the presentation
- Showcase each student's unique creativity



Book Format Options

- Traditional Book: Cover, fiction or non-fiction story
- Handwriting / Calligraphy: Personalised text style
- Scrolls & Scrapbooks: Collage and layered presentations
- Photo Books: Text arranged around images
- Comics / Storyboards: Drawn or animated stories
- 3D / Shaped Books: Cut-outs, layered pages, or pop-ups
- Wood or Food Art: Painted panels or baked shapes to illustrate stories

Materials & Artwork



- Paper, card, fabric, foam, wood, mixed media
- Graphics: Hand-drawn, painted, printed, computer-generated, collage, or photographic paper

Support from Other Subjects



· Wood Technology / Engineering teachers: Display stands or unique covers

Fabric & Textile Ideas



- Fabric books, tea towels, cushions or t-shirts using fabric pens / Batik / waterproof inks
- Foam books for younger readers (e.g. "magic foam")
- Computer graphics printed on fabric via iron-on transfer paper

Exhibition Guidelines for Schools

Setup

- Each school provides its own exhibit and on the day will receive:
 - A table (1m × 0.5m)
 - A display board for the back of the table
 - Art materials and stationery to mount your "Make a Book" entry

Attendance / Supervision

- At all times, students and a teacher must be present at their exhibit to explain the work and learning involved
- Visitors can explore other schools' exhibits
- Maximum of ten attendees per school, including teachers and parents
- Principals and Deputy Principals are welcome to attend
- Students must be supervised by accompanying adults at all times
- Schools must disassemble and take their exhibits with them after lunch

JCSP Make A Book Certificate

- All attending students will receive a certificate
- Additional certificates available for students who participated in the project at school

Student Participation

Visitors: 3-2-1 Notepads (as displayed on the next page)

During other schools' presentations, students should note:

- 3 things you liked about the book
- 2 things you learned about the books
- 1 thing you want to know more about



Presenters Participation-When presenting their book, students should include:

- 1. The rationale behind the chosen title and the content of the book
- 2. The process of creating the book and challenges encountered
- 3. Their favourite part of making the book
